Bible Reading:- Matthew 15:21-28.

Message.

This passage from Matthew is difficult for us
to truly understand unless we put it in
context. If we don't, Jesus' words can seem
cruel and demeaning towards the
Canaanite Woman he speaks to.

Matthew's community is predominantly
Jewish, that is, it is made up of those who
have been formed within the rich tradition of
thought forms and practices that have
shaped their understanding of God and
"God's will" for God's people.

Jesus for Matthew is a "new Moses" who
has come not to abolish the Law or the
prophets but to fulfil them. What we are
seeing in Jesus' encounter with the

Canaanite woman is just that. To our ears, what follows is appalling but to the faithful in Matthew's community, he reacts to the woman's request as they would expect of a rabbi in those days. She represents Israel's notorious ancient foe—the Canaanites. Traditional religious practices and prejudices, designed to guide Israel's relationship with “outsiders” and “enemies”, would support Jesus' brusque dismissal of her desperate concern for her daughter.

First Jesus gives this Canaanite woman the silent treatment. Then the disciples get involved: “Send her away, for she keeps crying out after us.” Then Jesus says, “I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel” (v 24) to emphasize his initial mission. It only gets worse. When she comes kneeling before him, Jesus insults her saying “It is not right to take the children's bread and toss it to the dogs”. Jews of Jesus' time would often refer to gentiles as dogs.

However, the Canaanite Woman is not deterred. She replies “Yes it is, Lord,” she said. “Even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table.”

What Jesus does next must have left his disciples completely speechless. Jesus said to this Canaanite lady, “Woman, you have great faith! Your request is granted.” And her daughter was healed at that moment.

This encounter serves as a valuable teaching moment for the disciples, showing them that faith and humility are more important than ritual purity or social norms.

It is also a valuable lesson for all of us regarding faith, humility and grace. The Canaanite Woman is focused. She doesn't react angrily to Jesus' insult, but instead she is thinking of one thing and that is her

daughter. Ultimately, it is her faith that speaks and Jesus hears it loud and clear.

Throughout his ministry, Jesus shows his love and grace poured out on people who are shunned by society. It is often the despised, the broken and the marginalized who have nowhere to turn but Christ. When you hit rock bottom, there is nowhere else to go but upwards and Jesus is there to pull us up out of the pit.

When I was working as a prison chaplain, one of our roles was to find churches for prisoners to attend on their release. Once found we would work with probation officers, church leaders and safeguarding officers as well as local police to ensure that attending worship was done safely. On release it is a prisoner's human right to be able to attend a place of worship and yet repeatedly we would speak to church leaders who told us that they didn't want ex-offenders in their churches. That rejection of those who had served their sentence and had faith, often newly found faith saddened me every time. At a point in their lives where they needed tremendous support the church said no. I am truly thankful that Jesus never does, whoever we are or whatever we have done. Christ meets us where we are and I pray that I always see myself as a saved sinner because of God's amazing grace and nothing I can boast about of my own doing.
